MiSiS Impact on Students with Disabilities

The District's announcement to take immediate action and fund resources at Jefferson High School needed to happen and AALA welcomes the corrective move. However, AALA wonders why the administrative team supervising Jefferson didn't act in a more timely and effective manner.

The Jefferson news clouds another alarming report that surfaced this week from the Office of the Independent Monitor on the impact of MiSiS on students with disabilities.

The independent monitor's report shows that major problems still exist. Key findings include:

- 98% of the 201 schools that participated in the survey reported problems with MiSiS, with 57% reporting they used alternative methods for maintaining data
- 83% reported problems with identifying students with disabilities enrolled at their school
- 69% reported varying degrees of problems with placement for students with disabilities
- 69% reported varying problems with services for students with disabilities
- Nearly 56% did not participate in any training
- 35% indicated inadequate training
- Interface problems continue between MiSiS and Welligent

By way of background, it was in 1993 that the **Chanda Smith** class action lawsuit was filed to challenge the adequacy of supports received by Chanda Smith, an LAUSD special education student. As one of its 15 outcomes, the Modified Consent Decree (MCD) requires the District to build an integrated student data system to track all of its students through all grade levels and school sites. The "new" system was to replace 26 "legacy" (aka "obsolete") student data systems. The new system was implemented at the start of this school year despite alarms about glitches in MiSiS and the lack of readiness for the system to be effective. On the District's MiSiS website it says,

"The beginning of a new school year is the only feasible time to implement this type of system, as a midyear transition from a legacy to a new system would cause an intolerable level of disruptions to instruction and operations.

CHANDA (Cont.)

While public attention has focused on schoolwide scheduling and other disruptive problems, we should keep in mind that MiSiS was also intended to remedy the District's failure to identify and track students with special needs and provide instructional services to meet their needs. As a result of that failure, Chanda Smith entered 10th grade with 2nd and 3rd grade reading and math skills. After repeating 10th grade twice, Smith's mother took action. The 1993 lawsuit found 21 areas of noncompliance by the District that included failure to identify, assess and serve students with disabilities (SWD), meet required timelines, offer designated instructional services and track, maintain and access records.

The rush to implement the imperfect technology of MiSiS just to bring closure to the MCD instead hit schools and students with a double whammy! In retrospect, it's been 21 years since the **Chanda Smith** lawsuit. Wouldn't the District have been better off to wait just one more year to genuinely refine MiSiS instead of foisting it upon schools before it was ready? It would have saved major disruption and disservice to students, as well as hours of additional labor for school-site administrators, counselors, teachers and other school personnel.

AALA PAC ENDORSES TORLAKSON

On Thursday, October 10, 2014, AALA PAC Steering Committee recommended, and AALA Representative Assembly voted unanimously to endorse **Tom Torlakson** for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The two candidates, incumbent Tom Torlakson and his opponent, **Marshall Tuck**, were both interviewed by the PAC Steering Committee. The PAC Council vote authorizes AALA to endorse and financially support its selection. Torlakson and Tuck have very different views on the condition of K-12 education in California, as explained in last week's *Update* (October 13, 2014).

Slick ads and catchy messages can't mask the fact that Marshall Tuck has received \$300K from **John Arnold** of Enron whose mission is to end public pensions around the country. Additionally, Tuck's campaign has received over one million dollars from local Republican **Bill Bloomfield** who had confronted and run against **Henry Waxman** who has never shied away from taking on the powerful and wealthy in the interest of democracy. Other donors to Tuck's campaign include billionaires **Eli Broad**, **Carrie Walton Penner** and **Laurene Powell Jobs**.

This election on November 4, 2014, is extremely important to public education in California. AALA urges our members and colleagues to support Tom Torlakson.

REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY HIGHLIGHTS

Following is a summary of the October 9, 2014, AALA Representative Assembly meeting, the first of four meetings of the 2014-2015 school year. Complete minutes will be posted on the AALA website.

President's Report:

1. **AALA membership numbers**: Nonschool, 754; school-based, 1,559; classified, 247; total, 2,560.

2. Negotiations:

- a. <u>Certificated Unit</u>: AALA has requested the start of negotiations on an MOU regarding the amount of the performance bonus for members with five or more years of experience which we negotiated last year during contract negotiations. We are waiting for the District to respond.
 - The bargaining team will be negotiating compensation again this year along with reopeners regarding two articles in the AALA contract.
- b. <u>Unit J</u>: Initial Bargaining Proposals will be developed in preparation for negotiations on Unit J's Successor Agreement (2015-2018).
 - The bargaining team reached agreement with the District for classified members to participate in a pilot program on evaluation this year. Participants will receive \$200 and will have the opportunity to take five hours of online courses for an additional \$300. Participation is entirely voluntary and no stakes. Participants' respective supervisors must agree to be involved.
- 3. **MiSiS** continues to be problematic, at best. The "fixes" sometimes help and other times don't. While emails are sent daily to principals, communication could be far better.
- 4. **LASDI**, the Los Angeles School Development Institute, has run out of grant funding.
- 5. Meetings with Senior Staff: Dr. Judith Perez and Dan Isaacs met Dr. Ruth Perez, Deputy Superintendent of Instruction, for the first time.

PAC Council Meeting:

Dr. Judith Perez introduced members of the PAC Steering Committee and explained its role. Secondary Director, **Harold Boger**, reported that the PAC Steering Committee interviewed both **Tom Torlakson** and **Marshall Tuck**, who are in a run-off for State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and he analyzed their differences.

Secondary Vice President, **Margaret Prietto**, presented the PAC Steering Committee's recommendations and led the discussion. The PAC Council voted unanimously to endorse Tom Torlakson, donate \$6,800 to his campaign and \$15,000 to one or more independent expenditure campaigns supporting his candidacy. The election is November 4, 2014.

David Tokofsky gave an update on the upcoming Board of Education elections to be held in March 2015.

REP ASSEMBLY (Cont.)

Old Business:

Margaret Prietto announced the results of the elections held during the elementary and adult department caucuses. The newly elected officers are **Nery Paiz**, Elementary Vice President; **Roger Avila**, Elementary Director; **Richard Guillen**, Elementary Director; **Juan Urdiales**, Adult Director (See announcement on page 2 of *Update*).

New Business:

Friends of AALA: At this year's annual reception, we kicked off our fundraising campaign for student scholarships by raising \$4,000, enough for two scholarships.

Department Reports:

Specific questions were asked; AALA leadership is obtaining answers, which will be available in the complete minutes on the AALA website.

The second AALA Representative Assembly Meeting this year will be held on Thursday, December 4, 2014.

HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ

TOPIC: NATIONAL SAVE FOR RETIREMENT WEEK - OCTOBER 19-25, 2014

In 2006, the United States Congress established the third week in October as the national *Save for Retirement Week* encouraging employees to review their personal retirement goals and assess whether they are on target to achieve those goals. The District offers two voluntary programs to help employees save for retirement.

What retirement plans are offered by the District?

LAUSD employees have the option to enroll in two tax-deferred retirement plans—a 457(b) plan and/or a 403(b) plan. The District 457(b) plan is managed by the District Retirement Investment Advisory Committee. This advisory committee is composed of representatives from the LAUSD unions and District staff. The plan provides several options for you to consider, and most importantly, fees and charges that are *extremely* low when compared with many 403(b) plans.

How do tax-sheltered annuities (TSAs) work? You set aside a fixed monthly dollar amount in a tax-sheltered annuity (TSA) to build an account from which you can draw after retirement. Since the money is taken out before being taxed, you lower your tax liability on your monthly salary. This money is then taxed at what is usually a lower rate when drawn out after retirement.

What effect will putting aside pretax dollars have on my take-home pay? Your net take-home pay will depend on how much you save each month. If you are under age 50, the maximum deferral amount set by the IRS for 2014 is \$17,500. Over age 50, you may set aside \$23,000. You should consult with

one of the TSA vendors to see what you can put aside for retirement and retain the same or nearly the same take-home pay.

What are the differences between the two District-sponsored retirement plans?

457(b) Plans	403(b) Plans

MISIS AND GRADE REPORTS

AALA thanks the member of the AALA/MiSiS Committee who sent the following comments.

MAJOR SECURITY FLAW - MUST CHANGE!

Anyone with an office manager role can enter or change a student's grade in a class. Under LAUSDMax, this was kept in a separate user role and was very closely held at schools. With MiSiS, pretty much any office staff member can change or enter a grade, whether their responsibilities involve grades or not. So much for information security... ASK ANY SCHOOL-BASED ADMINISTRATOR IF THEY THINK IT'S A GOOD IDEA THAT ALL CLERKS CAN CHANGE GRADES! The secondary Mark Reporting role should be the only role that has the ability to change report card grades.

REPORT CARDS STILL DON'T RUN FOR LARGE SCHOOLS

I still can't run a batch of report cards for my high school. This is particularly annoying because it seems to be a choice made by someone at Beaudry that the software as designed shuts down the report

card program after it runs for ten to twenty minutes. So people like me at school sites have to figure out (by trial and error) what size batch of report cards will run and then manually combine the reports already run off.

MISSING MARKS REPORT STILL DOESN'T WORK ON SCHOOL RUNS

I can't tell which teachers have turned in grades and which haven't. The report, when exported to PDF, shows all missing grades under the name of one teacher. This was reported weeks ago and hasn't been fixed yet.

VERIFICATION ROSTERS DON'T WORK PROPERLY

Verification rosters are just a printed report of grades a teacher assigned students in his/her classes. Many students are showing twice on a verification roster for a single class.

NO WAY TO DISPLAY OR EASILY PRINT ALL GRADES FOR ONE STUDENT

With the old SIS system, it took about 5-10 seconds to display all of the grades on a recent report card for a student and a few more seconds to print. You could also display or print a "grades in report card format" to show all grades at once for a student. We would use these programs often in the past if a parent or teacher wanted to see the grades for a student. There is no way, other than printing report cards, to do this. To print a report card for one student, I have to: (put "wait for MiSiS to LOAD after each one of these steps") Go to reports, click on Report Cards, Secondary, identify my ESC, select my campus, select my school, select the term code, select the grade-reporting period, then from the drop down student menu deselect "select all" then scroll down through the 2800 students at my school to find the student I want to print a report card for, click on View Report, Export to PDF, then print. It has to be MUCH faster to view/print recent grades for a student.
