**BARGAINING BULLETIN:
NEW TENTATIVE AGREEMENTS
REACHED ON SALARY**

On Tuesday, May, 26, 2015, AALA’s certificated and Unit J bargaining teams reached tentative agreement with the District on an improved multiyear salary package, in keeping with our prior agreements with the District to provide us with “comparable treatment” in the event of a higher salary settlement with another bargaining unit (in this case UTLA), as described in a recent *Update* (Week of May 18, 2015). The new AALA agreements contain the provisions outlined below:

- The June 2014 agreements regarding salary will be replaced by the new agreements.
- AALA members, certificated and classified, will now receive on-schedule raises totaling 10% over two years instead of the previous 6.5% on-schedule plus the 2% off-schedule bonus over three years. Below is a comparison between the new and the old agreements:

- For active AALA members, the 2% off-schedule bonus for 2013-2014 will be treated as an “advance” or credit of 2% toward the 4% on-schedule raise starting July 1, 2014.
- Retirees will keep the 2% off-schedule bonus they earned for 2013-2014.
- The 2.5% raise previously scheduled to be implemented on July 1, 2016, will instead become part of the larger and earlier on-schedule increases. AALA will retain the opportunity to re-open negotiations in the spring of 2016 regarding salaries for the 2016-2017 school year.

Both the Unit J and the certificated agreements need to be ratified by their respective AALA members in order to be presented to the Board of Education for final approval. Because the end of the school year is imminent, ratification will take place quickly. AALA members will be able to vote online via Survey Monkey to support or oppose their respective agreement from 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 4, 2015, to 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 9, 2015. A simple majority (50% + 1 of those voting) is required for

ratification of each agreement. Results will be published in *Update* on Thursday, June 11, dated Week of June 15, 2015.

Assuming that the agreements are ratified, they will go to the Board of Education for final approval in August 2015. The ongoing raises are expected to be reflected in members' salary warrants starting in September 2015. The retroactive salary payments, as outlined above, will be provided in that warrant or separately.

HIGHER FEES FOR CREDENTIALS

Governor Brown's proposed budget includes an increase in the fees charged by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) for teaching and administrative credentials. The recommended increase is from \$70 to \$100; however, the amount may change in the final adopted budget. The increase is necessary as the CTC's revenue has fallen while the workload has increased. There are fewer applications for credentials because the number of those entering the profession has fallen by more than 70 percent since 2008. The workload increase is due to the rising numbers of complaints about teachers and administrators that the Commission must process, which has resulted in a significant backlog. The additional funding will allow the CTC to speed up their investigations.

CHILDHOOD SUICIDE

According to the American Medical Association (AMA), youth suicide is a major public health concern in the United States. It was the second leading cause of death in adolescents aged 12 to 19 years in 2012, accounting for more deaths than cancer, heart disease, influenza, pneumonia, diabetes, HIV and stroke combined. In children 5 to 11 years of age, it was the 11th leading cause of death, a statistic that has remained constant over the last two decades. Despite the stable rate, a study published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association Pediatrics* found a trend during this period in this group of children that had previously not been recognized: there was a significant increase in the suicide rate among black children and a significant decline in the suicide rate among white children.

This study was initiated because there was limited information about suicides in children younger than 10 years of age, so using 20 years of data from January 1, 1993, to December 31, 2012, the authors investigated trends and characteristics of suicide victims aged 5 to 11 years. During these years, 657 children committed suicide in the United States; 84 percent were boys. The rate for white children dropped by nearly one-third, while for black children, it nearly doubled. Further analysis is recommended to identify the factors that contribute to this racial disparity, but the study did say that black children experience disproportionate exposure to violence, traumatic stress and aggressive school discipline. They are also less likely to seek help for depression, suicide ideation and suicide attempts. The study encouraged suicide prevention organizations to work more closely with educators on identifying warning signs of suicide and mental health issues.

**HEALTH BENEFITS FAQ:
GRILLING SEASON AND FOOD SAFETY**

Longer, warmer days signal grilling season and cookouts. It is important to remember that bacteria thrive in hot weather and may cause food poisoning. Here are some safety guidelines to help you and your family stay food safe this grilling season.

Are there any safety precautions I should take when marinating meats or poultry?

The FDA recommends that you always marinate in sealed containers in the refrigerator, never on your countertop. If you want to use your marinade as a sauce after cooking, set aside a portion of it before adding to meats. Or, if already added to meats, boil the marinade first to kill harmful bacteria.

What about utensils used during grilling?

Any utensils or brushes used on raw meat or poultry should be washed before using them again on cooked food to prevent cross-contamination. When finished grilling, use a clean utensil to place the meats or poultry on a serving platter.

Foods like chicken and pork usually take long to grill. How safe is it to partially cook the meat ahead to shorten the grilling time?

The FDA says it's safe as long as you immediately finish cooking on the hot grill. Never brown or partially cook meat or poultry to refrigerate and finish later because any bacteria present would not have been destroyed.

I sometimes grill different meats, like chicken, hot dogs, burgers and ribs at the same time. How can I tell when everything is finished cooking?

Use an instant-read thermometer to check for doneness, but remember to wash the thermometer's stem to avoid cross-contamination after using and before inserting in a different meat. Put your food thermometer in the thickest part of the meat or poultry to measure the internal temperature. Safe cooked temperatures for meats, after rest time (after removing thermometer), if specified, are:

- Ground beef, pork, veal, lamb (no rest time) – 160⁰
- Steaks, roasts and chops (3 minutes rest) – 145⁰
- Chicken breasts, thighs, legs and wings (no rest time) – 165⁰
- Hot dogs – Grill until steaming

We occasionally have cookouts at the park or beach. What's the best way to keep foods safe while the children play?

Invest in a well-insulated cooler to keep perishable foods cold, especially in hot weather. Remember that bacteria grow on raw and cooked foods rapidly in warm weather, increasing the likelihood of causing foodborne illness. Add ice or frozen gel packs to keep items cold until it's time to grill.

When eating outdoors in the patio is it still safe to leave food out for about two hours?

When eating outside during days that are above 90° F, food should not sit out for more than one hour.

Is there a way to check if my instant-read thermometer is accurate?

Yes, you can check the calibration by bringing a small pan of water to a rolling boil and taking the water's temperature; it should be 212° F or a few degrees less, depending on your altitude and barometric pressure. The boiling point in Los Angeles is generally between 210⁰ F and 211⁰ F. If the temperature is off, turn the hex nut under the thermometer face to recalibrate.

DACE STUDENTS ENTER NATIONAL COMPETITION



Fourteen LAUSD students from the Division of Adult and Career Education will be competing in the National SkillsUSA Championship in Louisville, Kentucky, from June 22 - 26, 2015. SkillsUSA is a partnership of students, teachers and industry that provides programs, events and competitions to support career and technical education. The annual championship competition is the showcase for the best career and technical students in the nation. More than 6,000 contestants compete either as individuals or teams in 98 different trade, technical and leadership events and are judged by labor and management in industry.

The students who will be traveling to Louisville were the winners at the state level and they attend Friedman Occupational Center and Slawson Southeast Occupational Center. The six students from Friedman won in the areas of graphic imaging, career pathways showcase and leadership.
