AN OPEN LETTER TO AALA'S FREE RIDERS

If you are surprised to be getting today's newsletter because you normally do not receive it, more than likely, you are a *free rider*. Normally, only AALA *members in good standing* receive the weekly *Update*. A member in good standing supports the association by contributing \$40.84 a month in dues to support collective bargaining, representing members in conferences and investigations, and in disciplinary and dismissal cases, among other actions.

As a result of the *Janus v. AFSCME* Supreme Court decision on June 27, 2018, free riders are those who benefit from the association's collective bargaining efforts *without* paying their share of the cost. The

association is bound to represent free riders in negotiations, even though they do not meet their obligation to contribute dues. It is not fair that free riders do not shoulder their portions of the cost, but place it on the backs of their colleagues who are members in good standing.

The good news is you may not even know you are a free rider. Prior to the Janus decision, the association, by law, was able to collect monthly dues from all frontline managers. These dues contribute to collective bargaining and other actions that benefit both members in good standing *and* agency fee payers. It is important to note that pre-and-post Janus, the law mandates that the individual voluntarily opt-in to the association. The opt-in process pre-Janus was to complete a very simple one-page form. Post-Janus, the process is more formal and is submitted electronically. To change your free rider status, take a moment to click the following link and complete and submit your intent to become a member in good standing: Member Authorization.

Please note that your dues do <u>NOT</u> have to subsidize the association's political activities, such as endorsing candidates or supporting initiatives. You simply need to check "no" when asked if you wish to support the association's Political Action Committee (PAC). By the same token, if you are a member in good standing and have not done so already, check "yes" if you do want to support the PAC.

It is imperative for all frontline managers to opt-in and pay the monthly association dues. Your willingness to do so sends a strong signal of AALA unity. As importantly, your dues will ensure AALA's continued advocacy on your behalf to garner competitive salaries, healthcare at no cost to you, and improved working conditions. If you still have reservations, please remember, that unions are democratic and for decades have underpinned the middle class. Unions like ours have elected representatives and conduct voting to approve the collective bargaining agreements that have been negotiated on behalf of all of its members. HEALTHCARE FAQs— EATING DISORDERS ARE DANGEROUS

A recent news article from the UK highlighting an English teenager who became blind and deaf from eating a diet of sausages, processed ham, Pringles, and white bread since age seven provided the impetus for this FAQ.

What is an eating disorder?

Eating disorders include psychological, behavioral, and physiological symptoms. They are complex illnesses exhibited by severe eating behaviors linked to thoughts and feelings about food, body image, and/or weight. Studies show that eating disorders can lead to heart and kidney problems and even death, making early diagnosis and treatment imperative. According to the American Psychiatric Association, women between the ages of 12 and 35 are the most affected.

I know a little about anorexia and bulimia. What are other types of eating disorders and their symptoms?

- Anorexia nervosa Anorexics exhibit extremely low body weight, triggered by the persistent fear of gaining weight and being overweight. Anorexics severely limit calories, exercise excessively, take laxatives/weight loss supplements, and/or vomit after eating. Anorexics may have trouble sleeping and suffer from malnutrition, loss of menstruation, constipation, abdominal pain, irregular heart rhythms, low blood pressure, and dehydration.
- *Bulimia nervosa* This is characterized by cycles of binge-eating and purging. An individual with bulimia usually is of normal weight or slightly overweight. Emotional symptoms include low self-esteem linked to perceptions of a negative body image, feeling out of control, and guilty about eating. S/he may also withdraw from friends and family. The physical toll may include chronic acid reflux, tooth decay, damage to digestive tract, and dehydration from loss of electrolytes that causes cramps, muscle spasms, irregular heart rhythm, heart failure, kidney problems, and even death.
- *Binge eating* Binge eaters have no control over food and overeat in a very short period of time. They overeat even when not hungry and do not purge after eating, exercise excessively, or take laxatives. Binge eaters may feel shame, disgust, and get depressed about their eating behavior. Although some binge eaters maintain a normal weight, most become overweight or obese, with complications related to obesity, like high blood pressure, high cholesterol, heart disease, and Type 2 diabetes.
- *Pica* Individuals with pica eat nonfood items such as chalk, dirt, hair, and paint chips, to name a few. Pica typically affects children between the ages of one and six years and symptoms include upset stomach/pain, bowel problems, blood in urine, intestinal blockage, and lead poisoning (from eating paint flakes).
- Avoidant/restrictive food intake disorder Characterized by a lack of interest in eating, individuals with this disorder avoid certain types of food, like those of a particular color, texture, smell, or taste; or certain foods perceived to cause an adverse reaction, like choking. Avoidance can result in lack of meeting daily nutritional requirements for good health.

What causes eating disorders and how is one treated?

Scientists have yet to find the cause(s) of eating disorders. Experts believe that eating disorders serve as a coping mechanism for emotional distress. Causal factors may include heredity, environment (cultural

ideals/pressures), peer pressure, and emotional health (perfectionism, impulsive behavior, relationships). Eating disorders are diagnosed by a physician, but treatment generally involves medical treatment/medication, psychotherapy, nutritional counseling, and weight restoration monitoring. Aside from the disorder itself, an individual may have other medical needs that result from the disorder.

NEW CHARTER SCHOOL GUIDELINES ESTABLISHED

Governor Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 1505 (O'Donnell, D-Long Beach) on Thursday, October 3, 2019, which provides more guidelines regarding the approval and regulations of charter schools. After several months of negotiations with the governor's and Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond's staff members, CTA and the California Charter Schools Association were able to come to an agreement and were present when he signed the bill into law. There are more than 1,300 charter schools in the state with enrollment totaling more than 11 percent of public school students; Los Angeles County alone is home to roughly one-quarter of the state's charters.

The rapid growth of charters in the last two decades has put a financial strain on many urban districts which wanted a moratorium on new charter schools. The new law will permit school boards and county offices of education to consider the potential financial impact of a new charter school in determining whether to approve it or not. Districts that have been certified as financially troubled or facing state takeover will be able to automatically deny a new charter school while others will have to show that it will *substantially undermine* or duplicate existing services and programs that are offered at a nearby school that is not overcrowded.

The new law specifies that school districts *shall not renew a charter* if it has received two straight years of poor ratings on California's Dashboard rating system, but districts must also consider all mitigating factors before making the denial. There is also a two-year moratorium on new virtual charter schools.

Another provision of the law requires charter school teachers to obtain a teaching credential. Previously, only those teaching core subjects — math, science, language arts — had to have a credential. Charter schools still have to be renewed every three to five years, and under the new law, may be extended for seven years. Other protections for charter schools include:

- Financial impact is not a consideration for renewal of a charter.
- Districts still must approve charter petitions that satisfy the requirements of the law.
- A charter school can still appeal to the county office of education if its renewal has been denied.
- Existing charter schools with two consecutive years of strong test scores, graduation rates, or performance by English learners cannot be denied a renewal.

CITIES WITH THE HIGHEST GRADUATION RATES

24/7 Wall St., a financial news and commentary website that covers the stock market, industry research, and government policy on the economy, reviewed the percentage of high school seniors who graduated on time in 382 U.S. metropolitan areas and identified 50 cities where the most students graduate in four years. While the national graduation average is 85%, all of the cities on their list had graduation rates of at least 91%. The data that was used was from the 2016-17 school year and was included in 2019 County Health Rankings & Roadmaps, a collaboration between the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute.

The city with the highest graduation rate is Wichita Falls, Texas, with 96.7% of its students graduating from high school. The second place city is Elizabethtown-Fort Knox, Kentucky, which had 95.1%. Sadly, California only had one city (actually three lumped together) among the 50 that were identified and it was actually number 50, San Luis Obispo-Paso Robles-Arroyo Grande. The three combined cities had a graduation rate of 91.5%.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, high school graduates are more likely to be in better health, less likely to be unemployed, and typically earn about 28% more annually than those who have not completed high school.

WHAT ARE WE CELEBRATING?

When many of us were growing up, October 12 was Columbus Day, not a school holiday, but celebrated throughout the country as the day Christopher Columbus discovered America. Still today, Columbus Day is a United States federal holiday, observed on the second Monday of October, commemorating the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492. Five hundred years after he "discovered" the


New World, historians have continued to dig into the life of Christopher Columbus and controversy has arisen over continuing to honor the Italian explorer as a hero due to the catastrophic impact of European settlement on native populations throughout the new world. There are three main sources of controversy involving his interactions with the indigenous people he labeled *Indians* (because he thought he had arrived in India): the use of violence and slavery, the forced conversion of indigenous peoples to Christianity, and the introduction of a host of new diseases that would have dramatic long-term effects on Native Americans.

Beginning in 1991, dozens of U.S. cities and a few states began instituting an Indigenous Peoples' Day, a holiday that celebrates the history and contributions of Native Americans—rather than Columbus. The states of Florida, Alaska, Vermont, New Mexico, Wisconsin, and Maine do not recognize Columbus Day and have replaced it with celebrations of Indigenous Peoples' Day. Hawaii calls it Discoverers' Day and in South Dakota, Native American Day is celebrated on what was formerly Columbus Day. Oregon, Iowa, and Nevada just do not recognize Columbus Day as an official holiday. Several states have removed the day as a paid holiday for state government workers, while still maintaining it—either as a day of recognition, or as a legal holiday for other purposes, including California and Texas. In 2017, the city of Los Angeles replaced Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples' Day.
