
Shift Happens

dministrators returned from a much needed and earned Thanksgiving ABreak to a reorganized structure that obliterated two local districts. With a mid-year shift to four regions, Superintendent Carvalho is looking to save \$40 million by eliminating "redundancies and duplication of services." AALA has fielded many calls from concerned School Support Administrators asking, "What will happen with my position?" While the word on the street is that no position is being cut, School Support Administrators providing direct services to schools are hearing they will be required to re-apply for their 2023 positions. This trepidation leaves members feeling stressed, undervalued, and disposable given the future uncertainties and gross lack of communication and transparency. The rumor milling about is the District's intent to have an outside agency conduct the selection and interview processes. One high-ranking senior staffer has assured AALA this is not the case.

The "been there done that" (Remember ESC N, ESC S, ESC West,

ESC East, and ISIC now aka as HEET?) reorganized regions are "supporting" between 250 and 275 schools. Schools have the same needs; students have the same needs. AALA reminds senior staffers that as they "analyze" "redundancies and duplication of services," keep in mind an administrative coordinator supporting schools should not be expected to provide the same level of support to a larger number of schools next year.



AALA demands the needs of every school and every student be the driving force to determine the exact service of every school community. As importantly, those AALA members supporting every school from Beaudry and the regions must have the appropriate staffing, budgets, and tools to serve every school community genuinely and joyfully.

Healthcare FAQs - Do You Need To Combat Chronic Inflammation?

Por many of us, the new year brings resolutions for improving ourselves and reversing bad habits. Losing weight, exercising more, not eating junk food are probably on many lists. While we know what we should do, we know it's not easy. This week's focus on inflammation may add impetus to get on track to a healthier lifestyle.

What are the two types of inflammation?

Our bodies tell us when we have inflammation—pain and/or redness from a wound, swelling from fluid buildup, heat caused by blood accumulation, and loss of function. Called "acute inflammation," these physical symptoms tell us our immune system is actively fighting infection or injury that leads to healing. Our bodies may also have "chronic inflammation"—inflammation we cannot see. Diabetes, cancer, high blood pressure, heart disease, autoimmune diseases, and gastrointestinal conditions are among diseases associated with chronic and long-term inflammation. In the United States, 50% of all deaths are attributable to diseases related to chronic inflammation.

How does the immune system produce chronic inflammation?

Chronic inflammation may result from autoimmune diseases, long-term exposure to toxic chemicals, or infections or injuries that don't heal. Autoimmune diseases, like lupus, psoriasis, celiac disease, and rheumatoid arthritis are conditions where the immune system attacks and damages healthy tissue. Research has also found that lifestyle habits—your diet, stress level, sleep problems, alcohol intake, and obesity may also cause chronic inflammation. Because this inflammation tends to develop slowly, people may not know they have a problem until they are diagnosed with a disease.

What are some common symptoms?

Symptom of chronic inflammation include, but are not limited to pain (body, joint, or muscle pain), frequent infections, gastrointestinal problems (acid reflux, diarrhea, constipation) chronic fatigue, insomnia, weight gain or loss, and depression, anxiety, and mood disorders.

How is chronic inflammation detected?

- According to a Cleveland Heart Lab report, there are five ways to assess your own risk for inflammation: Waist size greater than 40 inches for men, and 35 inches for women
- Gum disease, linked to risk for stroke in men and younger adults
- Sleeping less than 6 hours
- High sugar intake—between 17-21% of your total calories
- Disease, your symptoms, there are tests to diagnose inflammation

Tests for inflammation involve simple blood and urine tests. If you have symptoms that might suggest inflammation, consult your primary care physician about the C-Reactive Protein (CRP) blood test as part of your annual blood draw. A higher-than-normal CRP level in the blood indicates inflammation.

How can I reduce my risk of serious disease associated with inflammation?

- Consume a healthy diet: Eat more foods high in antioxidants, such as berries (especially blueberries); dried and fresh fruit; vegetables such as curly kale, artichokes, red/yellow/orange bell pepper, spinach, sundried tomatoes; dark chocolate; nuts; seeds; and dried herbs and spices.
- Exercise regularly.
- Maintain a healthy weight; lose weight, if needed
- Get enough sleep—at least 7-8 hours nightly.
- Reduce stress. Engage in yoga, meditation, deep breathing, singing/dancing, counseling, and enjoyable activities.


District Schools Receive Top State Honor!



According to the California Department of Education (CDE), "since its inception in 1985, the California Distinguished Schools Award remains one of the important ways to celebrate exceptional schools, districts, teachers, and classified employees for their innovation, talent, and success in supporting students." The CDE provides the following information on their website:

To select California Distinguished Schools, the California Department of Education uses multiple measures to identify eligible schools based on their performance on the state indicators as specified on the California School Dashboard. Specifically, schools were selected by analyzing data reported through the 2022 Dashboard, including assessment results, chronic absenteeism, suspension rates, and socioeconomic data. The California Distinguished Schools program recognizes schools for their excellent work in one of two categories: closing the achievement gap and achieving exceptional student performance. Elementary schools and middle and high schools are recognized in alternate years; therefore, awardees hold the title for two years. Each year, two of California's Distinguished Schools awardees are eligible to become a National Association of Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Distinguished Schools Awardee.




